We welcome panels and papers from across a wide range of disciplines, including economics, history, literature, political science, and sociology. The 2024 conference will feature a roundtable discussion by specialists on the results of

The AACS annual conference offers a forum for interdisciplinary exchanges and policy dialogues and a diverse program with panels on issues of significance for scholarship and social and political policy.

About the AACS:

The AACS is an interdisciplinary association devoted to the study of subjects related to China and Taiwan broadly construed (www.americanassociationforchinesestudies.org).

Membership in AACS is required for participation in the annual conference, but those who are not currently members are welcome to submit proposals, join the Association, and participate in the annual meeting. We welcome submissions from junior and senior scholars and Ph.D. students from the U.S. and overseas. Please note that this conference is in-person only.

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
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WORDS OF THE PRESIDENT

MEMORIAL

Caleb M. Clark passed away on September 13 in Steilacoom, Washington at the age of 78. With his passing, the world lost a respected figure in the field of Taiwan studies and the AACS community lost a treasured colleague.

Cal was a lifelong academic. Cal earned his Bachelor of Arts degree from Beloit College in 1966 and his Ph.D. from the University of Illinois in 1973. He taught at New Mexico State University, University of Wyoming, Chung Yuan Christian University, Tunghai University, and Auburn University over the next forty years. At Auburn, Cal served as the Department Head of Political Science from 1992 to 1995, Alumni Professor of Political Science from 1998 to 2003, and the MPA program director from 2002 to 2012. He authored, co-authored or edited more than 25 academic books throughout his career, including Taiwan: Environmental, Political and Social Issues, Political Economy: Theories, Principles and Politics, co-authored with his daughter Evelyn Clark Benavides and Women in Taiwan's Politics: Overcoming Barriers to Women's Participation in a Modernizing Society with his wife, Janet. Cal also wrote the murder mystery, The Black Angels, for which he was honored at the Alabama Book Festival in 2017, and its seguel A Strait Jacket for Sarah. (Both are available on Amazon.)

Cal was a long-time AACS member and served as AACS president from 2003-2004. In 2015, AACS awarded him a Distinguished Service Award for his contributions to the association. In 2018, Cal wrote an article for the AJCS on the history of the AACS, which became a historic

document of the organization. Cal regularly attended the AACS annual meetings, his last being in 2018 at the University of Maryland School of Law in Baltimore

June 6, 1945 - September 13, 2023

Cal was a true friend and a mentor when I needed one. I first met Cal in April 1995 at a conference at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee. I was a newly-minted Ph.D. on the academic market with several job offers, none of which I was particularly excited. I discussed the dilemma with Cal, who helped me understand that it was okay to cast about a bit more. Another time, I asked Cal for advice on publishing my first book. Again, Cal helped me come to a decision that was right for me. That is what I most remember and value about Cal. Whether it regarded my career or family, Cal was always genuinely interested, and beyond that, his age and wisdom helped me figure out my own path.

I gravitated toward Cal at AACS meetings not solely because he offered sound advice but because he was in my comfort zone. Sometimes I would see Cal at an AACS reception or sit with him at dinner, and he'd give me an enthusiastic welcome, but then our conversation would flag. But I found that it didn't matter because Cal was always good company even if neither of us had terribly

enlightening things to say. We were AACS buddies. I always sought out and enjoyed attending his AACS panels. His enthusiasm for research and teaching was evident at these panels, and I found his presentation style endearingly awkward but always enlightening.

I am eternally grateful for Cal for writing a positive review of my book, Politics and Society in Contemporary China, in the AJCS. The book is a dense 440 pages, and I'm sure it was a chore to read, but his review was very flattering. Always gracious, Cal wrote: "An impressive textbook.... It is comprehensive, interprets the evolution of Chinese politics from ancient to current times in an incisive and convincing manner, links the present to the past better than most such books, and (last but not least for a textbook) is quite readable." What more could an author ask for? I'm sure his kind words contributed to a couple of sales!

I last saw Cal at the 2018 AACS meeting in Baltimore. I had recently signed a contract with Lynne Rienner Publishers for the second edition of Politics and Society and Cal was most enthusiastic about the project. In fact, the Lynne Rienner Publishers website still has Cal's praise on its website. In fall 2020, Cal asked me if I had any research ready for publication that could be included in a volume on Taiwan that he was editing with Karl Ho and Alexander C. Tan. I corresponded regularly with Cal as I feverishly worked on a chapter on Taiwan's military preparedness. The book Taiwan: Environmental, Political and Social Issues came out in 2021. My last interaction with Cal was to congratulate him on the publication of the book, which is a valuable contribution to the literature on contemporary Taiwan. In academia as well as in life, well done Cal. well done!

His co-editors of Taiwan: Environmental, Political and Social Issues, Karl Ho and Alexander C. Tan fondly remember Cal. Karl wrote: "Cal has also been a great friend, mentor and colleague to me. He inspired me on many things, particularly in research. Whenever we had a draft of a paper, I could count on him to do the final review and give suggestions for revision. He was very

generous in doing that: always willing to do the heavy lifting without taking credit. We co-authored quite a few papers, and I wish we had had many more. There was never enough working with Professor Cal Clark."

Alex Tan indicated that, although he knew that Cal wrote fiction in addition to his scholarly work, he did not know that the fiction was so serious. Alex expressed admiration for Cal for his prolific scholarship and for his dedication to editing the last several books despite being ill. He also fondly remembers the way Cal laughed and the loud bear like sound it produced...a love of life.

In Memoriam: Wen-hui Tsai

Dr. Wen-hui Tsai (蔡文輝), Professor Emeritus of Sociology, Indiana University-Purdue University at Fort Wayne (IPFW, now Purdue University Fort Wayne), a life member of the American Association for Chinese Studies (AACS) and its President in 2001-02, passed away in 2021. Although we will not be able to reconnect with him in person this year at the 66th AACS annual meeting (after his retirement, he moved to the West Coast), several AACS board members / former presidents have shared their remembrances as a tribute to this great social scientist.

Wen-hui was a member of the inaugural graduating class of Department of Sociology, National Taiwan University (1964)(His wife and fellow sociologist, Sarah, graduated in 1967). Wen-hui went on to earn a Ph.D. in Sociology from the University of California, Berkeley (1974) under the prominent sociologist Wolfram Eberhard. His pioneering dissertation was entitled, Patterns of Political Elite Mobility in China, 1912-1949.

He began teaching at IPFW in 1974, rose through the ranks, and accomplished a distinguished professional career before retiring at IPFW in 2003.

Wen-hui's "specialization is sociological theory, sociology for elders and family sociology," according to fellow AACS sociologist Walter Kiang, who describes Wen-hui as "the most productive author for all kinds of sociology textbooks in the Chinese Society and one of the most famous sociology scholars."

Peter Chow shared that Wen-hui "published several books in sociology which were adopted as textbooks in several universities in Taiwan. With his credentials, he was able to convince his publisher to publish a series of social sciences in various disciplines for college students in Taiwan. With his effort, he was able to invite some social scientists in the States to join this task with him and publish several textbooks in various disciplines of social sciences for college students in Taiwan."

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AACS former President Vincent Wang observed that "Over Wen-hui's distinguished career, he built a remarkable arc of interests and contributions to the fields of Chinese and Taiwan studies: elite mobility in the Republican era, mass mobilization campaigns and elderly welfare in post-Mao China, modernization and crime: The Taiwan case, social welfare programs in Taiwan, gerontology (or aging studies), particularly the Taiwan case – many of these studies pioneered the field and all of them solidly grounded in social science theories. The scope, breadth, and depth were all impressive."

Peter further points out that Wen-hui was "one of the first

scholars to write about Taiwan's farmers movement in the colonial period before Taiwan study became an emerging field of study. His specialty in gerontology contributed much to the Center of studies for aged people at National Cheng Kung University in Tainan, his hometown."

As the field of Taiwan Studies enters its fourth decade, it is useful to recall Wen-hui's trailblazing contributions. Peter observed, "As Taiwan's democracy gained its momentum in the late 1980s and 1990s, Wen-hui joined with a group of social scientists in the States to engage in a series of seminars/ conferences to promote Taiwan's visibility in international academic circles. He also published several articles on Taiwan elections and democratic consolidations to promote the international understanding of Taiwan's democracy."

After his retirement, he moved to Southern California, but he continued to contribute his talents to Chinese Community though Chinese American Human Services Association as a Board Member and went back to Taiwan to develop the first Gerontology Department and Research Center at National Cheng Kung University in Tainan, Taiwan.

In addition to his writings and teaching, Wen-hui made invaluable contributions to the field and the profession by his tireless work as the AACS President and his informal mentoring / role-modeling for young scholars. He is a life member of the AACS and served as the AACS president in 2001-2002. He is also a member of the editorial board the at American Journal of Chinese Studies for decades. He actively recruited some junior scholars to join the AACS conference and invited some sociologists to serve at the AACS board of directors.

AACS former President Professor June Teufel Dreyer remembers best about Wen-hui for "his cheerful disposition, always seeing the best in situations and in people. Telling his favorite joke about the lack of relevance in social science research -- involving a group of sociologists seeking information about people in a balloon. And just generally being positive about the world and those around him.

His students, Taiwan, and I, were fortunate to have known him."

AACS former President Professor Tun-jen Cheng summarizes his recollection of Wen-hui: "He's accomplished but unassuming, commenting on social science topics jokingly but not trivially, and in AACS sessions, kind to both old acquaintance and newcomers."

AACS former President Professor Yu-long Ling calls Wen-hui "a good and long friend of mine. We both taught in Indiana, so, we help each other in teaching (guest speak), we also published several books together. It is so sad to hear the news. I will be honored to contribute some thought to honor him."

The AACS proudly counts Professor Wen-hui Tsai as a devoted member and inspiring leader and gratefully honors his legacy.
